
A former site for limestone quarrying, this is an important and increasingly rare ecological habitat for wildlife. In recent years, without grazing, tree saplings grew, threatening this limestone meadow habitat, which was almost lost forever.

THE LIMESTONE MEADOW

has not been degraded by the use of fertilisers, insecticides or herbicides. This has enabled the creation of a habitat which is species-rich

supporting an abundance of wildflowers, butterflies, insects, animals, reptiles and birds.

THODAY WOOD

Alongside the 'Stairway to Heaven' the

woodland follows a natural cycle of

growth, maturity, decline and

regeneration. Fallen trees and the 'dead

hedges' created from management

provide an important habitat for fungi,

ferns, insects, birds and small mammals

which add to the diversity and

ecology of the area.

THE COMMUNITY ORCHARD

was established in 2023 for Parish

above the permissive path is covered with scrubby vegetation: brambles, hazel, dogwood and hawthorn. Coppicing is used to manage the area to benefit wildlife. The soil, enriched over the years allowed nettles, wild clematis, and hemp agrimony to become dominant.

THE UPPER SLOPE

This area is maintained by Box Parish Council with support from the Cotswold Wardens, the Community Payback team and the Lower Common Community Group. Work parties ensure the scrub is cut back and invasive species removed, to allow the growth of more delicate plants.
